WINDOW 21B CLOSE-UP

St. Martin, a 4th century Roman soldier, was sent as a young man to Gaul. On a bitterly cold day, Martin met a half-naked beggar. Having already given away all but the clothes on his back and his arms. but seeing no one else who would help the man, the young Martin drew his sword and halved his own cloak to clothe the shivering man. In his sleep, St. Martin saw Jesus Christ wearing the half-cloak he had given away. The vision inspired him to new ardor in the practice of his faith. Withdrawing from the military, he chose a monastic life, devoted to following the example of Christ. Eventually, he was persuaded to become a Bishop of Tours, but he continued in his profound humility and austere life. His saint's day is Nov. 11, traditionally celebrated with a goose dinner. There is poetic justice to this tradition, considering the legend that geese betrayed him with their gabbling when St. Martin tried to hide in a stall and escape his appointment as bishop.

THE GOSPEL......Matthew 25:31-46

Jesus said, "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

Jesus' Birth

The scene encapsulates the wonderful discovery the shepherds make of the Christ Child. Heaven comes down in the joyful announcements of "Peace on Earth" to the shepherds as musical vine work leads the eve from the angelic chorus through the shepherds, who "hurried off and found" Mary, Joseph and the Baby at the manger. The vine work suggests the Branch springing up from the family of David (Isaiah 11)-the Child whose Kingdom is Peace. Beneath the stable, we see the manger, a traditional symbol of the Eucharist, where both the ox and donkey know their "owner's manger" (Isaiah 1:3) and come together-both clean and unclean-Jew and Gentile-to feed on life everlasting.

About Our Patron Saint

Martin, one of the patron saints of France, was born in 316 at Sabaria, the modern Szombathely in Hungary. His early years were spent in Pavia in Italy. After a term of service in the Roman army, he traveled about Europe, and finally settled in Poitiers, whose bishop, Hilary, he had come to admire.

According to an old legend, while Martin was still a catechumen, he was approached by a poor man, who asked for alms in the name of Christ. Martin, drawing his sword, cut off part of his military cloak and gave it to the beggar. On the following night, Jesus appeared to Martin, clothed in half a cloak, and said to him, "Martin, a simple catechumen, covered me with this garment."

Hilary ordained Martin to the presbyterate sometime between 350 and 353, and Martin, inspired by the new monastic movement stemming from Egypt, established a hermitage at nearby Ligug. To his dismay, he was appointed Bishop of Tours in 371. He agreed to serve only if he were allowed to continue his strict, ascetic habit of life. His monastery of Marmoutier, near Tours, had a great influence on the development of Celtic monasticism in Britain, where Ninian, among others, promoted Martin's ascetic and missionary ideals. The oldest church in Canterbury, which antedates the Anglo-Saxon invasions, is dedicated to St. Martin.

Martin was unpopular with many of his episcopal colleagues, both because of his manner of life and because of his strong opposition to their violent repression of heresy. He was a diligent missionary to the pagan folk of the countryside near his hermitage, and was always a staunch defender of the poor and the helpless.

Martin died on November 11, 397. His shrine at Tours became a popular site for pilgrimages, and a secure sanctuary for those seeking protection and justice.







ST. MARTIN TAPESTRY IN THE NARTHEX



Martin, a Roman soldier preparing to be baptized in about 348, cut his military cloak in half and gave one part to a poor man requesting alms in the name of Christ. The tapestry was designed by Jacque Lamy and hand-woven in the traditional manner in the Aubusson region of France by Ateliers Pinton (est. 1515). The artist's image was faithfully reproduced using thousands of handdyed wool threads and hand-woven into a beautiful tapestry.

ST. MARTIN'S ALTARPIECE IN THE PATRON'S CHAPEL



This beautiful, winged altarpiece of polychromed sculptures was created in the late 15th century, an art form especially popular in that era. The exquisite wood carvings are believed to be from the historic state of Tyrol, a region in what is now northern Italy and western Austria. The piece does not attempt to replicate the fourth century costumes of St. Martin's era. Instead, the figures are clothed in costumes typical of the period when the altarpiece was created.

OLD TESTAMENT Isaiah 58:6–12

Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? Lord, who may dwell in your tabernacle? Who may abide upon your holy hill? Whoever leads a blameless life and does what is right, who speaks the truth from his heart. He has sworn to do no wrong and does not take back his word. He does not give his money in hope of gain, nor does he take a bribe against the innocent.
